On the 1 October we have organised a national event to relaunch the Networks new name and structure now encompassing Inherited Cardiomyopathies engaging with health care professionals involved in the care of ICC patients.

There were around 60 delegates on the day, the presentations included talks on Implementing National Specification for ICC Services in Scotland, Covid impact on services, key priorities, challenges—followed by 2 separate workgroups discussions Inherited Arrhythmias and Inherited Cardiomyopathies.

Both sessions were appreciated by colleagues attending and number of actions were noted:

- Establish AHP sub group (to include genetic counsellors and specialist nurses) to focus on the education programme & the role in the care of ICC patients
- Update NICCS Long QT Protocol to include patient pathway, testing children for LQT
- Establish Pathology sub group (to focus on SCD/SUD pathway, communication following post-mortem, uniformity of pathology reporting & genetic sampling)
- Develop referral pathways for primary care
- The role of the ICC service in coordinating care and surveillance understanding the clinical presentation in family members
- NICCS engagement with each HB in Scotland to discuss implementation of National Specification for ICC Services in Scotland & referral pathway
- Engagement with patient group to take specific pieces of work forward/consultation
